Questions:

1. Who is the person that passed away?

My great-great grandmother, Gramita passed away in two thousand and six. She lived to the old age of a hundred and six years old. She was the great-great grandmother on my mom's side. 3. Why did you decide to create your sugar skull in remembrance of this person?

The reason I decided the remember her because she is relatively close to me (I was alive during the same time she was) is because I think it's important to try to understand the life of someone before what they stand for or believe in is washed out, or watered down. 4. How does the Sugar Skull symbolize this person?

My sugar skull reflects this person in a couple symbolic and surface ways. Symbolically, Gramita was an artist, so i tried to use as many colors as possible to show how varied and risk-taking she was. I noticed that in her paintings she uses a lot of colors and textures to try to make the painting pop. I however when trying to make my sugar skull didn't really succeed in texture, I tried to use watercolor paint to dissolve the top of the painting slightly, but it only made an ugly hole. This shows how the idea of taking risks and betting chances can have a negative effect on your creations, which from a lot of stories I heard about her she did a lot. The trim on the bottom represents artistic design, making it look better for design purposes only, it seemed like something she would have done.

5. How has "Día de los Muertos" opened your mind up to celebrating the passing of loved ones?

"Día de los Muertos" opens my mind to celebrating the dead in a lot of different ways. My idea of celebration the dead is now in tribute and celebration of what they lived for, and not mourning the idea that someone is gone.
