
Abenaki Tribe

- The Abenaki lived in a manner similar to Algonquin in southern New England.
- They relied on agriculture (corn, beans, and squash) for a large part of their diet, villages were usually located on the fertile floodplains of rivers.
- The meaning of the name 'Abenaki' was "whitening sky at daybreak"
- In spring and summer, bands would gather at fixed locations near rivers, or the seacoast, for planting and fishing.



Shinnecock Indians

- The American Indian tribe located on easter Long Island in New York State.
- They have over 1,200 enrolled members
- This Native American Tribe historically spoke the Mohegan-Pequot language; now they all speak English.
- Historically the Shinnecock's wre farmers, hunters, and fishermen .
- The usually the women of shinnecock were the farmers and grew such food as corn and squash, the men did the fishing and hunting.
- Their name means "people of the stony shore," because their ancestral lands were on the southeastern edge of Long Island, south of Great Peconic Bay.

- Medicine used sassafras root oil for skin and health.
