About Langston Hughes

Bio- James Mercer Langston Hughes was born February 1, 1901, in Joplin, Missouri. Langston Hughes was an American poet, social activist, novelist, playwright, and columnist. Hughes attended Lincoln University and Columbia University. His first book of poetry, The Weary Blues, was published by Alfred A. Knopf in 1926. In 1930 his first novel, Not Without Laughter, won the Harmon gold medal for literature. Hughes is known for his portrayals of black life in America from the twenties through the sixties. Hughes refused to differentiate between his personal experience and the common experience of black America. He wanted to tell the stories of his people in ways that reflected their actual culture. Hughes died May 22, 1967 from Prostate Cancer.
