

Jadyn Robinson: Gun Violence has taken a big toll on my life. I recently lost my uncle to gun violence on Christmas day of 2021. I is just depressing to know that a life could be taken that easily.

Lyric Hicks: Data shows gun violence only went down 1% since 2021. Why do you think that happened?
